#### **Assurance Continuity Maintenance Report:**

The vendor for the Juniper Networks M & T-Series Family of Internet Routers running JUNOS 6.3r1 submitted an Impact Analysis Report (IAR) to CCEVS for approval on 24 May 2004. The IAR is intended to satisfy requirements outlined in Common Criteria document CCIMB-2004-02-009, "Assurance Continuity: CCRA Requirements", version 1.0, February 2004. In accordance with those requirements, the IAR describes the changes made to the certified TOE, the evidence updated as a result of the changes and the security impact of the changes.

The vendor has issued a new release of the JUNOS software, which included several software updates and added two new models, M10i and M320, to the family of internet routers certified by the evaluation of 14 January 2004. Validators have reviewed the changes and found that they are outside the scope of the original evaluation. None of the software modifications affects the security mechanisms that implement the functional requirements in the Security Target. As part of regression testing, the original test suite was re-run. The security mechanisms were found to be unaffected and the two new models were found to be similar enough to the current evaluated configuration to be considered equivalent from a security point of view.

Consideration of the nature of the changes leads to the conclusion that they are best classified as minor changes and that certificate maintenance is the correct path to continuity of assurance. Therefore, CCEVS agrees that the assurance is maintained for this version of the product.
